



## Gates COVID-19 Tracker, Wave 13 - Florida

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This document includes toplines for 799 responses to the Gates COVID-19 Tracker fielded December 9-15, 2020 in the state of Florida. The toplines report on the percentage of survey-takers who selected each response, weighted to Florida's general population (adults aged 18+) in Civis' consumer file. National toplines from this week are also provided for each question response for comparison.

Each question is labeled by its question tag (which was included in the Questionnaire document in brackets) and the question text. Some questions were only shown to a subset of respondents; the number of responses to each question is indicated by "N = " in the label. A description of the subset who were shown the question is also included below the question text, indicated by "Displayed if:" or "Shown to."

For some questions in the disease tracking section, we've provided two versions of the percentage of survey-takers for questions with display logic. On the left, "US (asked)" or "FL (asked)" represent the percentage of respondents who were asked the question; on the right, "US (all resp)" or "FL (all resp)" represent the percentage of all respondents, with an additional entry for "(Not asked)."

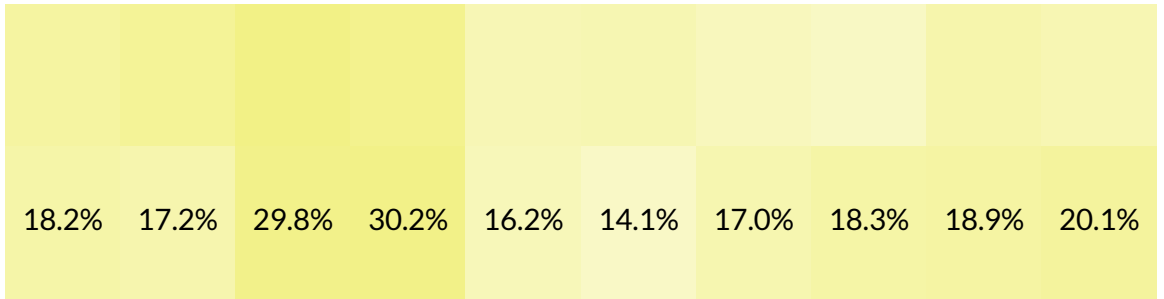
